The Springboard program assists young people aged 16-21 on Victorian Custody or Guardianship orders who are in residential out-of-home care, or who have recently left care. Springboard is provided by community-based organisations that have specialist skills supporting young people with education, training and/or employment. This will be achieved by SFYS providers: • Creating partnerships and pathways between schools and community organisations to support at-risk young people. • Coordinating the provision of community-based services in partnership with schools and community agencies to support schools to address the needs of at-risk young people. Transition Support for Young Refugees and other Vulnerable Migrants	The programme will improve workplace readiness, provide access to vocational opportunities, and create strong social connections through education and sports engagement. Service providers will deliver a range of projects and activities for participants such as after-school homework clubs, connecting with local employment services and jobs, and vocational or other further education opportunities. The pilot is being rolled out from 1 January 2016 for 18 months by six service providers by six service providers in 10 locations: In Victoria, Foundation House will deliver the programme in Greater Dandenong and Casey (Ucan2 program), and the Brotherhood of St Laurence will service the Hume area. Work for the dole	Eligible job seekers registered with a jobactive provider will need to participate in Work for the Dole or another approved activity for six months each year to keep receiving their income support if they have mutual obligation requirements. Work for the Dole activities can be hosted by not-for-profit organisations and government agencies. The programme gives organisations an extra set of hands
	to help to undertake activities that would not normally be done. Work for the Dole Coordinators work with host organisations to identify suitable activities. Work for the Dole can help job seekers:

Job Commitment Bonus	The Job Commitment Bonus for young Australians is a payment to encourage long-term unemployed young Australians to find a job, keep it and stay off welfare. The payments are conditional on retaining work for an extended period, providing an incentive for those who find a job to stay employed. Incentives target those aged between 18 and 30.
